Center Research and Community Activities

We invite you to read our 2022-2023 years report, which describes the research and community activities of the Center, now marking its 24th year. **Prof. Cwikel** transitioned from a Full Professor to an Active Emerita Professor, as of October 2022. We were granted with special permission for Prof. Cwikel to continue as director of the Center also after retirement.

I am very proud to report that the Center is active and vibrant as never before. We have a wonderful, dedicated, and productive staff and together we have racked up successes and achievements.

We have recently scored two important grants. One to expand our work on biomarkers of anxiety and depression through the use of *voice* and narrative *analysis* in primary care together with senior BGU and Kupat Holim Family Physicians, **Profs. Aya Biderman** and **Roni Peleg**. The second grant is from the Unit to Improve Teaching at BGU, is to create podcasts of different lectures to help to teach topics relating to trauma to 3rd year BSW and 2nd year MSW students. Collaborating on this grant are M2M coordinator **Yulia Yehezkel**, **Ms. Limor Niego** and **Dr. Nirit Gordon**, who are both lecturers in the BSW and MSW programs, respectively.

Meet new staff members

We parted ways with our Center Administrator **Sigal Saban Balila**, who was elected Chairwoman of Naamat in the Beer Sheva region.



She was replaced by **Ms**. **Orit Cohen-Rothman**, an accomplished administrator who was working in the Zlotowski Center for Neuroscience. She is also a yoga teacher who teaches yoga for women and pregnancy and has recently started to teach yoga to those coping with cancer and brings her skills and insights into her work in the best fashion possible.



Ms. Yulia Yehezkel did her army service in an elite computer unit in the IDF and retrained to become a social worker at BGU and finished in 2021. She joined Mom to Mom (M2M) as a young mother and decided she wanted to specialize in this type of work. She also works part time in the parents-children treatment center of Beer Sheva and has a free-lance business teaching other small business owners how to sell their skills. In other words, Yulia is clearly multi-talented. Since she joined M2M, there have been increases in volunteers and new moms who have joined the project.

Yulia teaches a unique seminar on the secret language of babies,

Alfayumi-Zeadna also delivered lectures in Segev Shalom on promoting with the local staff of the Mother-Infant Health, in collaboration with the local staff of the Mother-Infant Health Center.

Continuing research:

<u>Assessment of psycholinguistic markers of clinical mental states using a</u> <u>multimodal analytic system - Combined Vocal and Narrative Analysis -</u> (COVANA)

Prof. Julie Cwikel, Dr. Dan Vilenchik (Senior Lecturer, Faculty of Engineering), *Dr. Alison Stern Perez* (Post-doctoral researcher at the Center), **Mr. Ruslan Sergienko**, data manager, Faculty of Health Sciences, and **Ms. Rachel Abramovich**, MSW, field manager and a graduate of our retraining program here at BGU, social work department.

The World Health Organization (2019) estimates that 7.4% of global DisabilityAdjusted Life Years (DALYs) are lost due to mental and behavioral disorders, with unipolar depression the third leading cause of disability worldwide. Diagnosis of mental disorders generally involves a clinical interview with a psychiatrist and/or filling out a battery of questionnaires, which can be burdensome and intrusive, requiring significant time as well as compliance and communication skills. Thus, there is an urgent need for an innovative, non-intrusive, and effective detection method of mental illness symptoms.

While research using Machine Learning (ML) was harnessed to this task, using biomarkers such as voice, the obtained accuracy so far does not meet clinical requirements. Our research builds on the research we have conducted in five different samples since March 2020, to develop an automatic pipeline for the analysis of high-quality correctly-labeled voice and narrative recordings that will allow the differential diagnosis of persons with and without clinical symptoms of depression and anxiety, the two most common mental health challenges see in primary care in the community. Furthermore, our innovation (international patent pending) allows for the characterization of mental stress/distress/trauma into past exposure with or without emotional regulation, and current mental distress/disorder. This gives rapid, inexpensive answers to complicated clinical questions such as: who to process further for evaluation, who to send directly to psychological treatment/psychiatric attention and who is at low risk for current mental health impairment. Using both *machine learning* and *narrative language programming* (NLP), we have developed a set of analytical tools that can help to solve the problems of how to rapidly diagnose persons in need of additional mental health care treatment and those who do not need additional care, on the basis of short voice recordings, using high quality equipment. The results are validated against commonly used diagnostic tools designed for community epidemiological studies.

We have collected high quality data from 270 person using trained interviewers. This year we won a grant for applying our algorithm for use in Kupat Holim Clalit primary care clinics. This is a collaborative effort with **Prof. Aya Biderman**, a well-known family physician who is the head of Community Medicine at BGU, and **Prof. Roni Peleg**, also a family physician at BGU. We are in the process of attaining the requisite ethical approvals so that we can go into the field in three different Kupat Holim clinics and further develop the program into a user-friendly app.

CB-ART (cognitive behavioral and art-based interventions), collaborative research with Monash University in perinatal mental health

This clinical intervention which combines between cognitive behavioral and art-based therapy methods, has been the source of a number of publications with **Dr. Ephrat Huss**, **Prof. Orly Sarid**, **Dr. Johanna Czamanski-Cohen** & **Prof. Julie Cwikel**. This project was funded by the Pratt Foundation through a special BGU-Monash University grant initiative.

Dr. Hilary Brown published a pilot study of using our model of CB-ART to work with eight new mothers admitted to a five-day residential treatment program in Melbourne Australia. Collaborators on this study included **Prof. Jane Fisher**, **Dr. Heather Rowe** (Monash University), **Prof. Orly Sarid** (BGU), and **Prof. Julie Cwikel**. The data indicated that the CB-ART is a feasible, acceptable and safe protocol for mothers in residential care.

Last year **Dr. Meital Simhi**, **Prof. Orly Sarid** and **Prof. Julie Cwikel** completed a test of their workbook-based protocol, called WAWA (Why Are We Anxious?) with 34 new mothers, working to ease common anxieties that present during pregnancy and in the post-partum period. Our analyses show that it is very effective in reducing symptoms of anxiety, stress and depression in the post-partum period and very acceptable to the mothers who participated. While we intended to conduct this intervention over the internet, this was not chosen as a treatment option, with the women preferring a group or telephone intervention mode. This paper was published in 2021.

Graduate Students Creating New Research in Women's Health

Two graduates this year:

<u>Alex Davidov</u>: "Neurofeedback training as a tool that contributes to function and regulation of the emotions under stress among Israeli soldiers in IDF" supervised by **Prof. Julie Cwikel** and **Prof. Talma Hendler**, Tel Aviv University, Sackler Medical School. Alex's thesis was approved and he will receive his Phd. at the next graduation ceremony.

Nuha Sliman: "The effect of family structure on children's morbidity in the first year of life in Arab society". Jointly supervised by **Prof. Jonathan Anson** and **Prof. Julie Cwikel**. Nuha is proud to have completed her research together with the birth of two children. A paper from her thesis has just been accepted for publication.

Children's books by our PhD. Graduate who created a new way of working with fathers.

Dr. Avigdor Kaner developed an innovative internet-based group intervention for new fathers during their first postpartum year. His study evaluated the effectiveness of this unique intervention for new fathers and showed that it was well received by them. They felt that were few areas where they could express their emotional reactions to the challenging of parenthood and that this internet-fathers' group provided that. A paper has been submitted for publication from his thesis results. Avigdor was supervised by Prof. Dorit Segal-Engelchin and Prof. Julie Cwikel. Based on his experiences, Avigdor wrote an amazing children's book for fathers called:



The Gift that will Stay Forever, illustrated by Julia Po.

Post-doctoral fellow

These past two years, we were joined by psychologist, **Dr. Alison Stern Perez**, whose expertise is the linguistic structure of **trauma narratives**. We analyzed traumatic birth stories, supplied by **Dr. Tahli Frenkel** of the Interdisciplinary Center in Hertzlia. Alison has developed the ACORD model which analyzes both the structure of the spoken message such as the use of pronouns and the non-verbal aspects of the message such as the speed and timbre of the speech patterns. Alison is part of the COVANA research team. Together, we are supervising the PhD work of two students, **Noa Sviger** and **Shani Vilchenski-Tannenbaum**; both are senior clinical social workers working in the area of women's health who are analyzing the birth narratives of women with instrumental interventions at birth (e.g. C-section) and the differences between first and second births, respectively.

Ph.D students

Lior Deray: Lior is in the final stages of her data analysis and writing of her PhD student in social work, supervised by **Prof. Julie Cwikel**. Her topic: adjustment of soldiers in combat support roles: effect of background variables, coping strategies, gender and unit atmosphere on drop-out. This research is taking place in the IDF mental health unit with the collaboration of **Dr. Avishay Antonovsky**. Lior somehow manages to juggle the demands of a PhD with being the Mental Health Officer for IDF in charge of the Gaza region and being the mother of three small children. She gave birth to a son, her third child close to a year ago.

<u>Merav Daniel:</u> Merav is an educational psychologist who is now working on her thesis proposal on the topic of the testing of a cognitive-behavioral protocol to promote the return to work of women recovering from breast cancer. Merav started her PhD work just at COVID19 began and it complicated the issues for breast cancer "graduates" who wanted to return to work, given that many were not able to return to their former jobs. She has now completed all of her data collection and is beginning an intensive period of data analysis and writing. She is being jointly supervised by **Dr. Ofer Edelstein** and **Dr. Svetlana Prokashev** together with **Prof. Julie Cwikel**.

Community Activities: Mom to Mom

Mom to Mom (M2M) is now in its 18th year, providing support for new mothers and their infants in Beer-Sheva and the Negev. "Mom to Mom" is a project designed to help mothers cope with the first year of parenting through home visits of volunteer mothers in the Jewish sector and direct support from the coordinators in the Bedouin sector. The aim is to provide support and guidance to mothers of the Negev who feel that they lack adequate support to make the transition smoothly. We are proud that we are now able to run M2M in both the Jewish and Bedouin communities of the Negev.

In the Jewish population, we have had an increase in both mothers who joined the project (between 24-30 per year), with the coordinator conducting almost 40 home visits, with some 60 mothers who were in contact with the project. In the past six months, we have had some 15 new volunteers join the project and be matched with new birthing mothers.



We started a new project in the First Birth Ward of Soroka University Hospital where our volunteers have been giving short talks on M2M twice a week and have so far reached 30 new mothers. They are now in touch with the coordinator, and we have greatly expanded our work in Soroka University Hospital.

This year, both M2M projects were delighted with the donation of knitted and crocheted toys to distribute to the participating mothers, babies and older siblings. The knitters were organized by Judit Bar-On, who organized this wonderful donation. All the group are residents of the Palace Retirement Home in Lehavim. In the past they had donated knitted and crocheted hats, booties and blankets for the newborns.



Mom to Mom for Bedouin Women

We are now beginning our third year of running M2M for Bedouin women in the Negev. We provide support and guidance for new Bedouin mothers and their infants up to one-year post-partum to help smooth the transition to parenting and to bolster their mothering skills. A particular focus of the project is the detection and prevention of post-partum depression. When detected, the project ensures that the mother gets professional treatment.

This project is directed by our post-doctoral researcher, **Dr. Samira Alfayumi-Zeadna**, who has adapted the project and made it culturally sensitive to the needs of new mothers from the Bedouin population. This special project is being funded by a project grant from the **Two Lilies Foundation of Denver, Colorado**. The project runs in several locations around the Negev including: Segev Shalom, Rahat, Lakiya and soon in other locations as well. **Ms. Roza Abu-Ajena** joined M2M in March 2022 as a part-time staff member.

Dr. Samira Alfayumi-Zeadna is a senior clinical nurse with training in perinatal health. Her Ph.D. research explored the prevalence and risk factors of postpartum depression among Bedouin women of the Negev, and community. In her research, she developed a model for working with Bedouin women to detect, and treat PPD. **Ms. Roza Abu-Ajena** has experience working with mothers at the early childhood center in Segev Shalom and working in the alternative medicine field with women and children.

The project sees about 80 women a year, and all are counseled in person or by phone by the project coordinators. Issues include high-risk pregnancies, nutrition, detection and treatment of perinatal depression, developing social support and attention to medical issues. In May-June of 2022 we ran a positive parenting group for 8 new mothers in Lakiya with four weekly sessions. In June 2022 we conducted two group meetings with 8 new mothers from Segev-Shalom.

Using the EPDS questionnaire to detect perinatal depression, the results showed that 50% showed some symptoms of PPD and 27% had clinical symptoms. All those in need of treatment were referred to the appropriate treatment modality and some were referred to psychiatric care.

The Center was privileged to host **Anna Schmitt**, representing the *Two Lilies Foundation* as she came to make a field visit here in the Negev from the 2-5th of June, 2023. She visited both the BGU campus and the group working in Segev Shalom. **Samira** presented findings from this project at the **WAIMH** (World Association of Infant Mental Health) meeting in Dublin Ireland, July 17th, 2023, together with **Anna Schmitt**.

Isha Be-Shela – Counselling Service for Women and Men in the Negev

The Center's counselling service, which is the first counselling service in the Negev designed specifically to meet the needs of women and now men, has now been operating for 17 years. During these years, this service has become a well-known and highly regarded psychotherapy service in the Negev. This is reflected in both the growing number of clients who seek our counselling services and in the growing number of referrals from the professional community. Since the beginning of the project, we have seen close to 900 women and men in psychotherapy treatment, with around 80 persons in treatment at any given time, with the average age of 30. A majority of them are BGU students. At this current time, we have a waiting list and more people looking for treatment than we have room with the current group of 10 psychotherapists. Ms. Limor Niego is the clinical coordinator who conducts the intakes and connects between those looking for therapy and the available psychotherapist. Ms. Neta Magen gives supervision in small groups and if needed, individual supervision. Ms. Matan Einav is also providing small group supervision and is giving a workshop on how to terminate treatment in a therapeutic fashion. This year, **Dr. Nirit Volk** gave a year-long supervision series on treating sexual abuse in the family. Each psychotherapist has their own expertise ranging from complex trauma, eating disorders, health-related issues in psychotherapy including substance abuse, the use of CBT, family therapy, and art in psychotherapy, among other topics.
